The centre of Dunedin's thriving buzz is the Octagon, an eight sided square lined with al fresco cafés and bars, in the heart of the city. You will find the grand architectural masterpiece of Dunedin's original railway on the edge of the CBD, an impressive stately building made from basalt, limestone and granite with traditional clock towers. It is home to the city's annual ID Fashion Week when the country's fashionistas line the sides of the long railway catwalk.

There is much to do and see in Dunedin. Drive the winding road of the Otago Peninsula through Macandrew Bay, a quaint harbour front coastal settlement, ten kilometres from town. Continue to the point of the Peninsula where the blue ocean and white sands meet, to discover yellow eyed penguin settlements, fur seals, sea lions and the elusive Albatross, with the only mainland

breeding colony in the world.

Larnach Castle



Dunedin is known for its ancient architecture, so act like a Scot, head to the peninsula and discover the country's only castle. Larnach

Castle was built in 1871 by a love-struck merchant baron and politician, William Larnach, for his darling wife Eliza. The castle has a scandalous history of adultery and suicide and is said to be haunted, so watch your back.

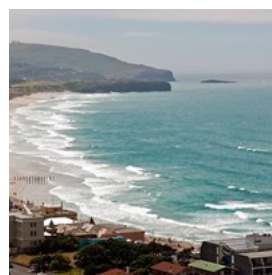
